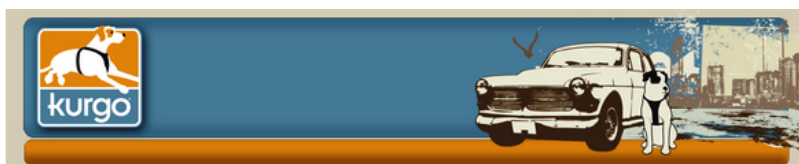


Review: Kurgo's Backseat Bridge

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I was contacted recently by **Kurgo** representatives and asked if I would be interested in sharing my thoughts about a new product they recently released: **Backseat Bridge**. Since the girls travel in my car daily the product piqued my interest, so I agreed.

The **Backseat Bridge** arrived and I looked over the box to see the features. The Backseat Bridge is reversible, tan on one side and black on the other. It's also waterproof, which is great. I have a small section in the middle of my backseats that can be pulled down and opened to display cup holders. I use that to add my "To Go Bowl", so the girls have water to drink. While I try to keep a small amount of water in our To Go Bowl, to prevent the water from spilling out, we've had a couple of accidents. The Backseat Bridge has a cup holder and storage pocket on the "black" side of the center barrier, and a storage pocket on the flip side, the beige side, of the center barrier.

So, I took the product out of the box. It took me less than 10 minutes to put it in my car and it would have been quicker had I not been holding the camera in one hand. I made a short video clip, which shows you how very easy it in your car.

In addition to the **Backseat Bridge** covering the length of the backseat, you can fold one side of it to make room for a person to sit there. Since I was doing the video recording myself, I couldn't sit in the car to show you. However, I borrowed this photo from **Kurgo's website**, where you can see a person sitting on one end, and how the one piece it tucked under. This is a great feature.



All in all, I like this product. It gives the girls more room to stretch out, especially Riley, while adding some addition protection. How? The center piece, that goes between the two front seats, creates a barrier. This is where Kiko likes to be. The barrier will prevent her from going forward in the event I should quickly brake. She is connected to the seat belt but you never know. I don't mind her trying to position herself so that she is stretched out between the back and front seats, but I am always afraid that if I had to do a hard break she could be disconnected from the seat belt and fly forward. The Backseat Bridge's barrier is the best feature, in my opinion.
